a year here he was transferred back to the Industrial school, where lessthan a month after his return he escaped again and after being caught was retransferred to the House of Correction for remainder of his minority

Case 6: Now 20 years old. Committed to the Industrial school at the age of 16 for steading and selling unks. After running away three times he was transferred to House of Correction in 1934 at age of 19. He has had up to seventh grade schooling and is now working on the prison farm, but receiving no other schooling. Case 7: Now 22 years old. In 1929 at age 16 he and an older brother stole an automobile. Brother was sentenced four to five months at House of Correction, while boy was committed to Industrial school for remainder of minority. In September, 1930, he was transferred Windsor for escaping. In 1932 he was released on parole and six months later was given a 10 to 12 months' sentence for operating a motor vehicle without the owner's consent. After completion of this sentence in April, 1933, he was immediately recommitted for the previous breach of his parole. In August, 1934, he escaped from the prison farm and after being returned was given a sentence of from 1:2 to 2 years for escaping. He was in solitary confinement once in 1933 and twice in 1934.

Case 8: Now 20 years old. Committed to the Industrial school at

Case 8: Now 20 years old. Committed to the Industrial school at the age of 11 for stealing, homosexual tendencies and lack of proper environment. After six years here he was transferred to House of Correction for escaping and after remaining at the House of Correction for almost a year he escaped and was then given a sentence of a year to a year and a half for escaping, to be served after he becomes 21. He was in solitary confinement twice, once in 1933 and once in 1935. A social worker familiar with this case stated: "The family was receiving relief from the city but not enough to keep the family together. The mother went on the streets and was sent to the Rutland Reformatory. The child was placed in one institutional home after another and was adopted by several families but could not adjust himself. A psychiatrist's report showed that he was not normal mentally and needed special care. There was no proper place in the State for him so he was sent to the Industrial school as the best place available."
